It has been an industrious couple of weeks as learning has got off to a flying start. We have placed a strong focus on establishing good learning behaviours and expectations right from the start. The children have responded well to the behaviour policy and feedback from staff has also been positive. House jars are filling up with gold coins outside my office – take a look on the leader board on the right!

Handwriting and presentation are another priority at the start of the year, as this has such an impact on the children being clear about their learning. To support this, our current Habit of Mind is **Thinking and Communicating with Clarity and Precision**. In assembly, the children had some excellent suggestions about why and when this is particularly relevant – one child said the doctor might not know how to treat you if you are vague! They are beginning to understand that this will support them to avoid disagreements with their friends too.



Parents and Carers



Are you a parent or carer with an adopted child or a Special Guardian?

Every child who has been adopted, with a Special Guardianship Order or Child Arrangement Order, attracts funding for our child's school called **Pupil Premium Plus**. This is a special category of Pupil Premium funding especially to support learning and achievement of this group of children. It can be a vital source of funding for schools to ensure your child gets the extra support they need. However, unlike the Pupil Premium Plus funding for children in care, the school will only receive the funding if the child is recorded on the annual October school census. If they have not been registered, the funding will not be forthcoming from the Department for Education. Schools are not always aware which children have been adopted or have Special Guardianship or Child Arrangement Orders, as they rely on parents or carers to tell them. We understand this can be a sensitive topic and want you to feel comfortable sharing, but we can assure you that the information you tell us about your child is kept confidential and handled sensitively. We kindly ask that you let us know this information about your child. We will need some written evidence from you to confirm your child's status; this could be document from social services or a copy of the child's adoption or special guardianship order.

Every school has Designated Teacher for looked-after children and previously looked-children and in Robert Blair School it is **Josephine Leal**, who would be happy to speak to you about this. Alternatively, speak to **Ms Salik**.



How much could I be fined if my child misses school?

In the majority of cases, the school and the local authority will work to support families to help improve attendance. If that is not effective, parents may be fined or issued a court warning for poor attendance. Parents are also fined for taking pupils on holiday during term time. Under national rules, all schools are required to consider a fine when a child misses 5 days of school for unauthorised reasons. Fines for all school absences across the country are £80 per child per parent (if paid within 21 days) or £160 per child per parent (if paid within 28 days).

Holiday during term time.

A reminder that, like all Islington schools, we do not authorise holidays taken in term time. Some parents may believe that there is a right to a certain number of days holiday during term time. This is not true. You may be served with a Penalty Notice or a summons to court for your child/ren's unauthorised absence once your child turns 5 years old and will incur a fine from the Local Authority.




National Poetry Day






The Habits of Mind









Our focus is **Thinking and Communicating with Clarity and Precision** – being as clear as we can!

We discussed how people tend to use vague and imprecise language. They describe objects or events with words like "weird," "nice," or "OK" rather than telling you more clearly what they were thinking. You might want to know what was "weird" about the movie or why the party was "nice." They may call specific objects using such non-descriptive words as "stuff," "junk" and "things." The problem is that you do not know exactly what the person is referring to—what is the "stuff?"

Language and thinking are linked and inseparable. Our words represent our mind. When we strive to use precise language, it has a corresponding effect on our thinking. Our mind and our internal thinking maps become more precise, organized and focused.

The children thought about situations in which it is particularly important to be clear and precise, such as describing an illness to a doctor or giving directions. They are aiming to speak more clearly in lessons and around the school. This is supported by questioning from adults who can already be beard asking for more precise information. We hope you will start to notice an impact at home too!
