

## **Geography knowledge ladder**

In year	I need to
Year 6	<ul> <li>Know how physical and human geographical features can affect the human activity within a location.</li> <li>Understand some of the reasons for geographical similarities and differences between countries.</li> <li>Know how locations around the world are changing and explain some of the reasons for change.</li> </ul>
Year 5	<ul> <li>Know some major cities within countries in Europe, North America and South America.</li> <li>Know the position and significance of latitude, longitude, the Tropics of Cancer and Capricorn, Arctic and Antarctic Circle, the Prime/Greenwich Meridian.</li> <li>Have a more detailed understanding of physical geography: Rivers, coasts, the water cycle, climate zones, biomes and vegetation belts.</li> </ul>
Year 4	<ul> <li>Know the names, locations, countries and some capital cities within Europe, North America and South America.</li> <li>Have an understanding of time zones.</li> <li>Have a more detailed understanding of an aspect of physical geography: mountains, volcanoes and earthquakes.</li> </ul>
Year 3	<ul> <li>Know the names and locations of countries in Europe including Russia.</li> <li>Know the names and locations of counties and cities of the United Kingdom</li> <li>Know that the world is split into the Northern Hemisphere and Southern Hemisphere</li> </ul>
Year 2	<ul> <li>Know the names and locations of the 5 oceans.</li> <li>Know the names and locations of the UK's capital cities and surrounding seas.</li> <li>Know the difference between human and physical geographical features.</li> </ul>
Year 1	<ul> <li>Know the names and locations of the 7 continents. Understand that people's lives can be different in different parts of the world.</li> <li>Know the names and locations of the UK's countries.</li> <li>Know that places near the Equator are often hot and places close to the poles are often cold.</li> </ul>
FS	<ul> <li>Describe their immediate environment using knowledge from observation, discussion, stories, non-fiction texts, and maps</li> <li>Explain some similarities and differences between life in this country and life in other countries, drawing on knowledge from stories, non-fiction texts and – when appropriate – maps</li> <li>Know some similarities and differences between the natural world around them and contrasting environments, drawing on their experiences and what has been read in class</li> <li>Understand some important processes and changes in the natural world around them, including the seasons</li> </ul>

note: the 'top 3' ladder shows **some** of the key knowledge that children need in Geography per year group and how it is built on each year. This is not **everything** they need but should support your progression and be a useful tool for teachers.
